Twenty-Eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time



1st Reading - Wis 7:7-11 Responsorial Psalm - Ps 90:12-13, 14-15,

Second Reading - Heb 4:12-13 Gospel - Mk 10:17-30 or 10:17-27

28th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Mark 10:17-30 recounts the story of the rich young man who approaches Jesus to ask what he must do to inherit eternal life. In this passage, Jesus tells him to keep the commandments and, when the young man claims he has done so, Jesus challenges him to sell all he has and give to the poor, promising that he will have treasure in heaven. The young man, however, goes away sad because he has many possessions.

While this passage does not explicitly present the Beatitudes, it does reflect some of the values found in them, particularly regarding detachment from wealth and the call to humility and service. In today's reading, Jesus talks about how difficult it is for the rich to enter the Kingdom of God, which aligns with the Beatitude that states, "Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven" (Luke 6:20 and Matthew 5:3).

"Today's Gospel might make us uncomfortable about our possessions. This discomfort offers us an opportunity to consider our possessions and our family's commitment to the poor. Material possessions are a necessity in our culture. Our use of these possessions and our attitude about the importance is our choice, however. As one of the social teachings of the Catholic Church, the *preferential option for the poor*, is a choice we can make with the awareness that our faith in Jesus commits us to show our care for the poor."
