1st Reading - Dt 6:2-6 Responsorial Psalm - Ps 18:2-3, 3-4, 47, 51 Second Reading - Heb 7:23-28 Gospel - Mk 12:28b-34

The readings for the Thirty-first Sunday in Ordinary Time focus on the importance of love—specifically, loving God and our neighbors. In the Gospel, Jesus is asked which commandment is the greatest. He responds by quoting the Shema, a central prayer in Judaism, which says to love the Lord your God with all your heart, soul, and strength (Deuteronomy 6:5). He then adds that we should love our neighbor as ourselves (Leviticus 19:18). The term "Shema" comes from the Hebrew word "שְׁמַע"," which means "hear" or "listen." The Shema is a call to listen to God's commandments and to live in a way that reflects that love and devotion. The point Jesus is making is that love is at the heart of our relationship with God and with others. He emphasizes that loving God completely—mind, heart, and strength—should be our top priority. This love should also extend to how we treat those around us. Jesus combines the Shema with the command to love our neighbor to teach that true faith is not just about loving God in a personal way, but also about how we live that love out in our interactions with others. This holistic view of love is central to being a follower of Christ.

For families, this means that every day, we should strive to show our love for God through our actions, prayers, and how we treat each other and those in our community. It's a reminder that love is not just a feeling but something we actively do. By loving God and our neighbors, we fulfill the greatest commandments and live out our faith in a meaningful way.


